



California's Medicaid program, known as Medi-Cal, provides health insurance to low-income children, families, people with disabilities, homeless and elderly populations. More than 15 million Californians and nearly 50 percent of children get their healthcare through the Medi-Cal program, making it an essential program for preventive and routine care for kids.

The Coalition to Protect Access to Care, a coalition of doctors, healthcare workers, community health centers, Planned Parenthood, health plans and emergency responders, is supporting a proposed ballot measure to permanently use dedicated funding to support Medi-Cal providers such as hospitals, physicians, women's health and community clinics and health centers. These tax dollars will bring more federal funds back to California and improve access to critical healthcare services.

Specifically, the initiative would:



+ Increase funding for mental health programs that care for children and Medi-Cal patients



+ Expand access

+ Enable California to manufacture its own insulin and other prescription drugs for Californians at much lower prices than exist currently











For years, California has used a Managed Care Organization (MCO) tax — a tax on health insurance companies — to maximize federal funding and draw down billions of extra dollars, to support state programs. This initiative will ensure this much-needed revenue will continue, but permanently dedicate funding to Medi-Cal.

This initiative will increase reimbursement rates for Medi-Cal providers - some of which have not been increased in decades - and will **expand our state's education and training** to create a pipeline of healthcare providers including physicians, nurses, physician assistants, and medical assistants. These actions will bring more providers to areas across California where they are needed most.

In addition to **funding mental health programs**, and **reducing the cost of prescription drugs**, the measure will ensure that Medi-Cal patients have more access to preventive care, which will **reduce expensive and timely emergency room usage**, which will benefit everyone.

MCO Frequently Asked Questions

What does the Protect Access to Care Act Do?

Makes permanent the Managed Care Organization (MCO) tax – a tax paid entirely by insurance companies, and matched with federal dollars – to fund investments in healthcare provided by doctors, health centers, Planned Parenthood, hospitals, emergency responders and healthcare workers. The measure will increase access to healthcare for more than 15 million Californians who rely on Medi-Cal for health insurance.

It guarantees billions in healthcare dollars are spent as they were intended – on treating patients, capping administrative costs at 1%, and ensuring the remaining 99% is spent directly on healthcare, including primary and specialty care, reproductive care, emergency rooms, and mental health and expanding the healthcare workforce in California.

The measure protects more than \$4.3 billion in healthcare spending including nearly \$2 billion for primary and specialty care for low-income patients annually, more than \$500 million for emergency care and transportation and nearly \$300 million in annual reproductive health and family planning funding.

Will it raise my taxes?

No.This initiative does not raise taxes. It simply maintains an existing healthcare tax that is charged to the plans that participate in Medi-Cal and has existed for many years in California.

Will it raise my health insurance premium?

No. There have been independent actuarial analyses of this tax and its effect on health insurance premiums. They confirm that the measure will not have a direct impact on healthcare premiums in California.

Why do we have to do this with a ballot initiative?

Previously, revenues have been directed to the state's General Fund and used for various purposes. This ballot measure is needed to protect future funds from politicians and ensure that taxes on healthcare companies are used as they were intended – to increase access to patient care. This measure protects existing healthcare tax revenues from politicians so they can't spend the money on other pet projects.

How will this help our healthcare system?

By ensuring that billions in healthcare taxes are spent as they were intended – to expand and improve patient care. Will provide stability for the Medi–Cal system and for physicians, dentists and other providers to take care of low-income patients. Under the current system, which can lead to massive funding swings from year to year, many doctors have been wary of participating in the Medi–Cal program for fear of future cuts.

How will this help Emergency Room wait times?

Under the initiative, more than \$500 million will be used to stabilize emergency departments, including funding for emergency physicians and emergency medical transportation. Emergency departments have become overcrowded because patients cannot receive timely care from their primary care provider or specialist. This measure will help alleviate emergency room wait times by expanding primary care options for low-income patients. More preventive care will keep people out of emergency rooms, and more access to care will allow patients to turn to primary care physicians or other professionals instead of heading straight to the emergency room.

How will this impact mental healthcare services?

The measure allocates up to \$200 million annually to improve access to mental healthcare, specifically around increasing our state's capacity for inpatient psychiatric services.

Is this about increasing healthcare for undocumented immigrants?

Over the last decade, California has significantly expanded Medi-Cal coverage. We added millions of single childless adults to the system with the passage of the Affordable Care Act. The state has also made it easier for people to enroll in Medi-Cal, eliminating asset tests for recipients, and providing coverage to all residents regardless of immigration status. This measure does nothing to alter Medi-Cal eligibility in any way.

But these expansions of eligibility have put more pressure on Medi-Cal provider networks. With more patients in the system, it can be difficult for patients to get an appointment to see a doctor, dentist or care provider they need.

This measure will provide stability for those who treat Medi-Cal patients, increasing the number of people treating Medi-Cal patients, which will make it easier for those patients to get the healthcare they need.

Hasn't the Biden Administration signaled recently they will reduce the amount of MCO dollars states can collect?

Medicaid is a state/federal program and states have a variety of ways to provide their share of the funding. The MCO tax is one such method and has been in place for almost 20 years.

Reducing the amount of money states can collect from MCOs under Medicaid would represent a significant shift in federal policy.

While we can't guess what the federal government will do in the future, the initiative has mechanisms in place to adjust the tax to changing federal rules.

Doctors are already rich. Why do they need more money?

Our current healthcare system effectively punishes doctors for treating low-income patients. Payments to physicians and dentists treating Medi-Cal patients are made by the government, and those reimbursement rates for Medi-Cal providers have remained stagnant for more than a decade - and for some - more than 25 years. These low reimbursement rates coupled with the rising cost of inflation have led many providers to see no or very few patients on Medi-Cal.

These low payments have created havoc in our healthcare system, leading to hospitals facing closure and physicians having to make the difficult decision not to take on new patients.

This will stabilize Medi-Cal reimbursement rates to ensure more doctors, dentists and other professionals are available to treat and care for low-income patients.

Healthcare Coalition Submits Signatures to Qualify New Ballot Measure to Protect Healthcare Access and Funding

California's healthcare system is in crisis. In rural and urban communities alike, hospitals are closing, physician offices are having to shut their doors, dentists are unable to take on new patients and community clinics are struggling to meet the needs of the patients who rely on them. - Ensure that healthcare dollars are actually spent on patient care, requiring 99% of the money raised to go to patient care while ensuring administrative expenses are limited to 1%.
- Require annual audits to ensure the funds are not being misused by insurance companies.
