Hospitals on the frontlines of COVID-19



During the pandemic, California hospitals have cared for an average of almost
 5,800 COVID patients daily, including more than 1,500 in ICUs.



- Since December, that average jumped to over
 16,900 COVID patients a day with over
 3,600 requiring ICU care.
- During the first week of January, California
 hospitals cared for an average of over 21,000
 COVID patients a day, while the average number
 of hospital deaths from COVID was 485.

Over 90% of COVID
 positive patients who get
 treatment at a CA hospital
 make a recovery.




Hospital volume dropped significantly during the COVID crisis


The pandemic response came at a price – for hospitals and for patients.

California's hospital volume decreased dramatically, as many patients delayed care and potentially exacerbated their future health care needs.

This year alone, hospitals are projected to lose a net \$14.6 billion through the end of 2020.

National survey data indicates that more than 1/3 of hospitals have had operating margins drop by more than 100% from Q2 2019 to Q2 2020. Also, more than 40% of hospitals have experienced and increase in bad debt and uncompensated care



Affordability

Create an independent entity to analyze health care affordability and make recommendations for change to policymakers while opposing efforts to set aggregate spending targets and automatic payment penalties



Care Integration

Educate stakeholders on the value of coordinated care and oppose increased regulation of health care mergers, partnerships and affiliations
