Health

- Millions of Californians losing access to health care services
- Massive delays in care that lead to more advanced disease burdens and more costly treatment
- 7 million Californians could be denied coverage due to pre-existing conditions
- 900,000 Californians could be denied coverage *due to COVID-19* as a pre-existing condition
- Elimination of value-based care incentives and a return to a volume-driven system
- \$4,200 annual increase in out-of-pocket costs for individual insurance market enrollees



Financial

- 269,000 jobs statewide
- \$15-18 billion in federal funding for Medi-Cal
- \$29.3 billion in state GDP
- \$2.2 billion in lost state and local tax revenue
