MENTAL HEALTH IN CALIFORNIA: YOUTH NEED SUPPORT

Mental health **leading cause of hospitalization** for children under
18 in California.¹

1 in 3 7th and 9th graders 1in 2 11th graders experienced chronic sadness.³


The rate of suicide among Black youth in California **doubled** between 2014 and 2020.²

54% Parents and caregivers reporting negative impact on their mental health.


60% Black & Hispanic low-income mothers and caregivers' negative impact on their mental health as a result of work disruption.

'We need to do all we can': Dr. Mom Foundation created to help prevent physician suicides

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Roughly one doctor dies by suicide every day — twice the rate of the general population — while female doctors alone are three times more likely to die by suicide.

Journal of the American Medical Association found that 29 percent of practicing physicians reported depression, a rate twice that of US adults






LEADING UNDERLYING CAUSES OF PREGNANCY-RELATED DEATH INCLUDE

Signs Symptoms of Heart Disease

Heart disease is the leading cause of death among women in the U.S. who are pregnant or gave birth in the last 5 months (postpartum).

During Pregnancy and Postpartum

Symptoms to watch for in late pregnancy and up to five months postpartum:



NOTE: While some of these symptoms are common in late pregnancy, they may be a sign of heart disease especially if they are severe and do not go away after treatment.



If you have any of these symptoms and they don't go away:

- Contact your OB, midwife, family medicine doctor, or your primary care provider
- Describe your symptoms clearly and explain how sick you feel
- If your symptoms arise postpartum, be sure to tell the provider that you recently had a baby
- If your provider says your symptoms are normal, ask what symptoms should cause you to call or come back



Go to the Emergency Department

If you have persistent chest pain or severe shortness of breath, or otherwise feel extremely sick. If possible, take someone with you.



HIGHER ACE SCORES ASSOCIATED WITH MORE ER VISITS





ACE scores of ≥ 4 were associated with ≥ 3 ED visits in the past year compared those with an ACE score of 0.







HCAI (HEALTH CARE ACCESS AND INFORMATION) PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT:

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH LOAN REPAYMENTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS



- Purpose: To increase the number of behavioral health professionals providing direct care in California's health profession shortage areas
- Program is open through end of October



- Cohort 1 (awarded Aug 2022): 168 awards totaling \$4.5M
- Cohort 2 (awarded Sep 2022): 115 awards totaling \$3.25M
- Cohort 3 (awarded Oct 2022): 85 awards totaling \$2.5M
- Cohort 4 (to be awarded in Jan 2023)



HCAI PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT:

HEALTH PROFESSIONS PATHWAYS PROGRAM



- Purpose: To recruit and support students from underrepresented regions and backgrounds to pursue health careers
- HPPP awards help organizations build and expand:
 - Pipeline programs
 - Summer internships
 - Post undergraduate fellowships



- Cycle 1 (awarded Sep 2022): 20 awards, all with efforts to support behavioral health, totaling \$40.8M
- Cycle 2: scheduled to open in Spring 2023
